A Remarkable Tree: Charter Oak



Oak, a giant White Oak in which Connecticut's colonial charter was supposedly hidden from agents of the King of England in 1687. By many accounts, the tree was well over 500 years old when felled by a storm in 1856 and so big that 27 men once stood together inside its hollow trunk. Descendants of this remarkable tree were grown from its acorns and live throughout the state, including one that stands today in front of Fairfield's Old Town Hall (Steadman 2008).
